FROM THE NORTH

Take New Jersey Turnpike south to Exit 7. Take Route 206 south approximately 9 miles to the intersection with County 530. Turn left and follow 530 through Pemberton to the college.

FROM THE SOUTH AND WEST

Use the Benjamin Franklin Bridge from Philadelphia to New Jersey Route 38 or the Walt Whitman Bridge to Interstate 295. From the south, use the Delaware Memorial Bridge to Interstate 295. Interstate 295 intersects with Route 38. Take Route 38 through Mount Holly. Route 38 becomes County 530 in Vincentown. Follow 530 through Pemberton to the college.

FROM THE EAST

Use Route 72 west to the circle intersecting state Routes 70 and 72. Head toward New Lisbon on Four Mile Rd. (County 646) from the circle until it ends at County 530. Turn left at the water tower. The college is the first driveway on the left.
